

Why Pray to Mary?

- Church has always honored, not worshipped, Mary.
 - Declared "Mother of God" at Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D.
- Mary is a special grace to humanity & draws us to her Son.
 - "Mary is like the moon, for her light is always the reflection of a higher light." (Archbishop Fulton Sheen)
- As at wedding feast at Cana, Mother Mary intercedes to Jesus on our behalf.
 - "Because she gives us Jesus, her son, Mary is Mother of God and our mother; we can entrust all our cares and petitions to her: she prays for us as she prayed for herself." (CCC #2677)

The Story of Lourdes



- Small, unassuming town in southern France at foot of Pyrenees Mtns, near Spanish border.
- Many rock outcrops, largest called Massabielle.
 - Large grotto on the side.
 - Big enough to shelter in bad weather.
 - Trashy dumping area where wild pigs foraged.

 Feb. 11, 1858, while gathering firewood, 14-year old Bernadette Soubirous saw vision of "a beautiful lady" in an alcove above the grotto.

Total of 18 apparitions, final on July 16, 1858.

Early Cures


Catherine Latapie



- 39-year old from neighboring French town of Loubajac.
- Two fingers of her right hand paralyzed after she fell from a tree in 1856.
- On March 1, 1858, she awoke in wee hours of the morning with a strong urge to visit Lourdes Grotto.
- Met Bernadette at dawn, washed her hand in spring, fully cured.
 - Original agility restored even before she had dried her hand.
- That night, she went home and gave birth to her third child, who was ordained a priest in 1882.
- 1st cure recognized by Church as miraculous on Jan. 18, 1862.




Louis Bouriette



- Born in 1804. Lived in Lourdes.
- Permanently blinded in right eye after hit by shrapnel from quarry explosion, which killed his brother Joseph, who was at his side.
- In March 1858, Louis repeatedly bathed and re-bathed his right eye with water from the spring.
- After these ablutions his sight was fully restored.
- Verified by his doctor several days later.
- 2nd cure recognized by Church as miraculous on Jan. 18, 1862.

Early Cures

Pierre de Rudder



- Born in 1822 in Jabbeke, Belgium.
- Feb. 16, 1867, 45-year-old Pierre's left leg crushed by fallen tree.
 - Smashed both tibia and fibula below knee.
- Bones did not knit together, but ends became dead & blackened.
 - Bandages on open, festering wound needed changed 3 times a day.
 - Refused to have leg amputated.
- April 7, 1875, Pierre and his wife took train to Shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes in Oostacker, Belgium (replica of Grotto).
 - "Bones separated by about an inch in the swinging left lower leg."

Early Cures

- Pierre de Rudder (continued)
 - Left leg suddenly as sound as right.
 - Swelling had disappeared and both legs were same length again.
 - Muscles of left leg firm and strong, despite 8 years of atrophy.
 - Died of pneumonia on March 22, 1898, 23 years after cure.
 - Body later exhumed.
 - 2 inches of missing bone added to tibia & fibula of his left leg.
 - 5 g of phosphate of lime required, but only 1.6 g in bloodstream.
 - 8th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on July 25, 1908.
 - Lourdes' "most-discussed miracle" did not even occur at Lourdes.
 - First miraculous cure to happen without use of Lourdes' water.

Recognition of Cures

- Skeptics: Cures are psychological in origin.
 - Caused by religious hysteria, autosuggestion, and wishful thinking.
 - Many don't believe in God, thus supernatural miracles "cannot happen."
- How explain 2 inches of missing bone suddenly added to Pierre de Rudder's left leg?
- How explain documented cures of infants, young children, unconscious?
- Why are thousands of instantaneous cures documented at Lourdes and not that many elsewhere?
- Church established independent committees of doctors and medical professionals to thoroughly and objectively investigate reported cures.

Recognition of Cures


- Bureau des Constatations Médicales, from 1883 to 1947:
 - Medical fact-finding and evaluation committee.
 - Composed of any doctor or health care professional who wanted to participate in reviewing case of a claimed cure.
- Lourdes Medical Bureau, established in 1947:
 - In charge of screening patients, conducting clinical investigation, and selecting cases for further discussion by National Medical Committee.
 - National Medical Committee decision-making body also formed in 1947.
 - International Medical Committee of Lourdes, est. 1954 based in Paris.
 - Does not pronounce a cure "miraculous." That's done by the Church.
 - Only pronounces that a cure is "medically inexplicable."
 - Estimated only 10% to 20% of cures reported to Medical Bureau.

Recognition of Cures

- For a cure to be recognized as "medically inexplicable," certain criteria must be met and all the following facts established:
 - 1. The original diagnosis must be verified and confirmed beyond doubt.
 - 2. The diagnosis must be regarded as "incurable" with current means.
 - 3. The cure must happen in association with a visit to Lourdes or a Lourdes shrine (drinking or bathing in the water not required).
 - 4. The cure must be instantaneous (rapid resolution of symptoms and signs of the illness).
 - 5. The cure must be complete (with no residual impairment or deficit).6. The cure must be permanent (with no recurrence, e.g., after 5 years).

Number of Cures

- Over 7,000 cases of unexplained cures have been documented at Lourdes.
 - More than 2,500 cases pronounced "medically inexplicable."
 - Not all declared miracles by the Church.
- Only 70 cases of unexplained cures have been recognized as "miraculous" by the Catholic Church.
 - Not often done, since medical certification seen as sufficient.
 - From 1946 to 2018, 30 Lourdes cures declared miraculous.

Francis Pascal



- From Beaucaire, France. Born Oct. 2, 1934.
- Developed meningitis of spinal cord when 3 years old.
 - By June 1938, Francis' arms and legs totally paralyzed, also blind.
- In August 1938, his parents took the 3-year-old boy to Lourdes.
 - Doctor: "The child was traveling lying down and quite blind."
- After 2nd bath, Francis fully recovered sight and lost his paralysis.
- Lourdes Medical Bureau confirmed cure in 1946, 1947 and 1948.
 - Report: "Cure is now of 10 years duration. No medical explanation for instantaneous disappearance of the malady and its symptoms."
- 45th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on May 31, 1949.

Jeanne Frétel


- From Rennes, France. Born May 25,1914.
- Diagnosed with tubercular peritonitis in 1938.
 - Abdomen swollen and hard. Bedridden since 1945. Weighed 97 lbs.
 - Emaciated, high fever, needed strong doses of morphine daily.
- Arrived in a coma by train into Lourdes on Oct. 5, 1948.
 - Oct. 8, while unconscious, priest pushed tiny fragment of consecrated host into her mouth at Mass for the Sick at St. Bernadette's altar.
 - Immediately regained consciousness, stomach returned to normal, fever and pains disappeared, could get up, walk, and eat.
- Oct. 5, 1949, Lourdes Medical Bureau declared, "No medical explanation of this cure can be given. It is beyond natural laws."
- 52nd cure recognized by Church as miraculous on Nov. 20, 1950.

Serge Perrin

- From Lion d'Angers, France. Born Feb. 13, 1929.
- Feb. 1964, age 35, first neurological episode, right-side paralysis.
- Diagnosed with thrombosis (clot) in left carotid artery in Feb. 1969.
 - Right leg and arm paralyzed, losing sight in left eye.
- May 1969 pilgrimage to Lourdes. Returned home as bad as before.
 - Oct. 1969, granted invalidity pension, unable to do anything alone.
- 2nd pilgrimage to please his wife, train to Lourdes on April 26, 1970.
 - After Anointing of Sick on May 1, felt warmth throughout his body.
 - Could then walk unaided and see clearly without eyeglasses.
- Doctors' booklet on cure published Lourdes Medical Bureau 1973.
- 64th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on June 17, 1978.

Jean-Pierre Bély

- From La Couronne, France. Born in 1936.
- Paralyzed by multiple sclerosis that began in 1972.
- Classified by French health system as a total invalid by the time he went on pilgrimage to Lourdes in Oct. 1987 at age 51.
- Received Anointing of the Sick at end of pilgrimage.
 - That night, he felt warmth throughout his body, was able to walk.
 - All traces of the illness had disappeared.
- 66th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on Feb. 9, 1999.

Decline in Number of Cures

- Steady decline in number of medically acknowledged cures over last 100 years.
- Likely due to:
 - Increasing effectiveness of modern medicine (e.g., tuberculosis).
 - Strict criteria to be fulfilled and documented for a cure to be officially recognized as "medically inexplicable."
 - Hassle and cost to travel to meetings in France to be medically evaluated, including follow-up meetings (e.g., yearly for 5+ years).

Danila Castelli


- From Bereguardo, Italy. Born Jan. 16, 1946. Wife and mother.
- At age 34, started having severe blood pressure hypertensive crisis.
 - Also suffered a number of other serious health problems.
 - Underwent hysterectomy, annexectomy, and partial pancreatectomy.
- Danila and her husband, a doctor, went to Lourdes in May 1989.
 - When came out of the Baths she experienced an extraordinary feeling of well being and reported cure to Lourdes Medical Bureau.
- Lourdes Medical Bureau certified cure after 5 meetings (1989-2010).
- 69th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on June 20, 2013.


Sister Bernadette Moriau


- From Beauvais, France. Born on Sept. 23, 1939.
- Neurological problems started in 1987.
 - Acute sciatic nerve trouble made it difficult for her to walk.
 - Medical treatments virtually useless.
- In July 2008, she joined her diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes.
 - Condition no better upon her return home.
- On July 11, 2008, while in her convent chapel for Adoration, she felt an unusual sensation of warmth spread throughout her body.
 - Heard inner voice to get rid of all her medical aids, corset, and splint.
 - Her foot suddenly returned to normal position and she could walk.
- 70th cure recognized by Church as miraculous on Feb. 11, 2018.
