

- God created humans with free will.
  - The gift of free will had potential for evil.
- God made sin and moral evil possible, but humans made it actual.
  - Origin of evil when first humans turned away from God and towards selfish desires ("be like gods").
    - "The Fall" and "Original Sin"
- God did His part perfectly.
  - We are the ones who messed it up.

- Why did God give humans free will and allow us to misuse it?
  - Free will is required for true love.
  - True love must involve free choice.
    - Love cannot be forced.
- God wants us to voluntarily choose to know, love, and serve Him.

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- We all experience:
  - Physical pain (e.g., disease or illness).
  - Mental anguish (e.g., death of loved one).
- Many people experience severe suffering from natural disasters.
- Why God allows undeserved suffering is a mystery.
  - Let's look at some possible reasons.

- Most people self-centered and want to be self-sufficient and in control.
  - Don't want anyone telling us what to do.
- In times of difficulty we may turn to God and seek His help.
  - God is a vague emergency service.
  - Called upon only when going gets tough.
- If everything always wonderful, do you think we would need God or seek Him?

- Our Creator knows that true happiness lies in our relationship with Him.
  - Find joy when we align our will with God's Will.
- Suffering is often the means by which we give ourselves to God and seek His Will in our lives.
  - We may not do this as long as there is any other place to look for happiness.
  - We may not realize God is all we need until God is all we've got.



- Our illusion of self-sufficiency and selfcontrol must, for our own sake, be shattered.
- Pain & suffering shatter the illusion.
  - We are reminded we are not center of universe and not in control of our lives.
  - Helps us find proper perspective in life.
    - Abandonment of self-will to God's Will.





"Why must we suffer? What does it accomplish? The sin of Adam and Eve was to put their will above God's. This is the essential sin—to prefer our will to God's will. You can understand suffering as the medicine needed to right the underlying problem. If a bone breaks and begins to heal crooked, it must be broken again and set straight. Similarly, we need to uproot our own will and realign it with God's. The experience of physical or spiritual suffering patiently endured for God's sake is a most effective way of realigning our will correctly."

- Ruth Pakaluk, mother of 7, died of cancer at age 41

- God can bring good out of disease and natural disasters in other ways.
  - Opportunity to help others and develop virtues.
    - Compassion, empathy, unselfishness, charity, generosity...
  - Our own suffering allows us to develop courage, patience, fortitude, endurance, humility...
- St. Augustine: "God judged it better to bring good out of evil, than to have no evil at all."

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- If everything were always perfect, we would become lazy, hedonistic & selfish.
- Hardships can be blessings in disguise.
  - Can be catalyst for achieving new heights in our personal and spiritual lives.
- Growth occurs during hard times, times of struggle, pain and suffering.
  - In times of trial we turn to God and seek God's power and presence.





- God allows physical suffering to draw us closer to Him and to teach us spiritual truths.
- We learn wisdom through suffering.
  - Moral character gets formed through hardship.
  - Swimming against the current makes us stronger.




- God knows we may need short-term suffering for our long-term good.
  - Spiritual maturity and eternal life.
  - "No pain, no gain."
- Spiritual growth is not automatic.
  - Some people become bitter, rather than better, when faced with suffering.
  - Adversity can make us or break us, depending upon our reaction.



- God can cause good to emerge from evil and suffering.
  - If run towards God, instead of away from God.
- "The redemptive nature of suffering"
  - Integral part of Christian discipleship.
  - "Take up your cross and follow me."
- Christians throughout history have shown how suffering brought them closer to God and made them a better person.

- Thomas à Kempis, The Imitation of Christ:
  - "When you are troubled and afflicted, then is the time to gain merit."
  - "In the cross (suffering) there is the completion of virtue; in the cross there is the perfection of sanctity (holiness)."
  - "There is no health for the soul nor hope of eternal life, except in the cross."

- Our problems are "storms on the sea of life that are not meant to sink us, but to sanctify us."
  - Each "storm" is opportunity to grow closer to God.
  - As we grow closer, the more we love God and develop trust in God's care.
  - The more we love God, the more we desire to serve God and others.
  - The more we serve God and others, the more like God we become.

- Raw gold is dull, dark, and clumpy.
  - Its beauty is only potential.
    - Only after it is melted and poured into a mold, does it make beautiful jewelry.
- God allows trials to "melt me, mold me, make me" into His image.
  - "Trials show that your faith is genuine. It is being tested as fire tests and purifies gold." (1 Peter 1:7)
- "Temporal (earthly) trials are people's path to heavenly holiness."

- Pope St. John Paul II, On the Christian Meaning of Human Suffering:
  - "Suffering must serve for conversion, that is, for the rebuilding of goodness."
  - "Its purpose is to strengthen goodness in man himself and in his relationships with others and especially with God."
  - "It is suffering, more than anything else, which clears the way for the grace which transforms human souls."




## Offer Up Our Suffering

- "Offer up" our suffering for good of others
  - Julie Onderko: "Often those who are aging and suffering do not unite their pain with the redemptive work Jesus did on the cross. Archbishop Fulton Sheen lamented the 'wasted suffering' when he would pass by a hospital. He knew that some of the most important work for the salvation of souls could be done from a hospital bed."


- How can we not help but love in return this person Jesus, who:

- Hebrews 2:18: "Because he himself was tested through what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested."

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


