Can we follow Jesus without going to Church?



### Unchurched Americans

- Over 2/3 of American adults do not regularly attend any church or religious service.
  - Only about 1/3 of "nones" are atheist/agnostic.
  - About 2/3 believe in God/consider Christian. Why not at church?!
- 43% of adults raised Catholic no longer call themselves Catholic.
  - Only 29% of self-identified Catholics attend Mass weekly.
- "Spiritual" OK, "Religious" Not OK.
- Let's examine why it IS important to follow Jesus IN the Church.

# Supportive Community

- Living a truly Christian life is not easy.
  - It is hard to do difficult things alone.
  - Following Jesus fully can be tough work.
- A supportive community is important.
  - To receive help we need from God and others to live an authentic Christian life.
- Without fellow Christians, our faith would be stunted, fade away, and die.
  - A single coal will lose its fire.


# Supportive Community

- We don't go to Church to demonstrate our holiness or hide our sins.
  - The Church is not a haven for saints, but a hospital for sinners.
- Faith is deeply personal, but it isn't private.
   By its nature, faith is communal.
  - Faith must always be internalized, but it is best expressed, strengthened, and lived out with others.
- Christ knew this and left us His Church.
  - Lord's Prayer has plural pronouns (our, us, we).
  - Shows Christ meant for us to be in community.



#### CHRIST Willed His Church

- Jesus called the Twelve Apostles.
  - Jesus said, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." (Matt. 16:18)
  - Has lasted for 2,000 years (Acts 5:34-39)
- What did Jesus mean when he asked Paul,
   "Why are you persecuting me?"
  - Jesus equates Himself with the Church.
    - They are inseparable: Christ is the Head of His Body, the Church.

#### CHRIST Willed the Sacraments




- We are both body and soul, so Jesus entrusted sacraments to the Church.
  - Sacraments are outward physical signs of an inner spiritual reality.
  - Receive God's grace, love, and power.
- Christ is intimately encountered in every sacrament, but most especially in the Holy Eucharist.
  - Eucharist is "source and summit of the Christian life" and integral part of Mass.

## MASS: Praise God and Pray Together

- Two "lungs" of prayer:
  - Personal Prayer and Liturgical Prayer
    - "Private prayer is like straw scattered here and there: If you set it on fire it makes a lot of little flames. But gather these straws into a bundle and light them, and you get a mighty fire, rising like a column into the sky; public prayer is like that."
       (St. John Vianney)
- Join prayers of Adoration, Contrition, Thanksgiving, Supplication ("A.C.T.S.")

## MASS: Hear the Word of God

- During Liturgy of the Word, we hear God speak to us in readings from scripture.
  - We also hear Christ's voice in the homily.
    - If we listen with right frame of mind, we will receive a personal message.
  - "By the preaching of God's word, faith is nourished and grows in the grace-filled encounter with the Risen Lord." (Pope Benedict XVI)
- By hearing, we are prepared to enter into Christ's ultimate act of love — Liturgy of the Eucharist.









#### MASS: Share in Christ's Sacrifice on the Cross



- During the Liturgy of the Eucharist, we share in Christ's sacrifice on the cross.
  - God makes available to us, with lavish generosity, the saving power of the cross.
  - "It is the liturgy through which, especially in the divine sacrifice of the Eucharist, the work of our redemption is accomplished." (Vatican II)
- Archbishop Alexander Sample: Mass is re-presentation of Christ's sacrifice



- At Consecration during Liturgy of the Eucharist, bread & wine become Body & Blood of Christ.
  - In the ancient Jewish tradition, body and blood signify the whole being of a person.
  - By giving us his Body and Blood, Jesus Christ has chosen to give us His entire self.
  - We are intimately united to Jesus Christ's full humanity and divinity when we receive Him in Holy Communion.
- It's not a mere symbol, but Jesus' real flesh and blood, under the appearance of bread and wine.
  - Spiritual food for spiritual life (John 6:53-56).




- "We are what we eat."
  - By Holy Communion we receive grace to become more like Jesus Christ ("Christified").
  - Christ gradually changes our values, our thoughts, attitudes & our actions to become more like His own.
- Pope St. Leo the Great: "The effect of our sharing in the Body and Blood of Christ is to change us into what we receive."
- St. Augustine (regarding the Eucharist):
   Believe what you receive, receive what you believe, become what you receive.

# BREAD FOR THE JOURNEY

- Belief in "Real Presence" of Christ's body blood under appearance of bread and wine was present from the beginning.
  - Not a medieval invention.
  - Roman persecutions.
- St. Ignatius of Antioch (105 A.D.):

"I desire the bread of God, the heavenly bread, the bread of life, which is the **flesh** of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and I desire the drink of God, namely His **blood**, which is incorruptible love and eternal life."








- Only one-third of adult
   Catholics agree that "during
   Catholic Mass, the bread and
   wine actually become the
   body and blood of Jesus."
  - Nearly 70% of Catholics believe the bread and wine "are symbols of the body and blood of Jesus Christ."
  - Even 37% who attend Mass weekly believe the bread and wine "are symbols of the body and blood of Jesus Christ."

- It's surprising that not all **Catholics** believe in the Real Presence of Christ's body and blood under appearance of bread and wine.
- In order to manifest Christ's Real Presence and dispel doubts, God sometimes provides Eucharistic miracles.
- Eucharistic miracles are unexplainable phenomena, such as consecrated hosts bleeding and being visibly transformed into human flesh.

- Over 150 Vatican-approved EMs, including 5 scientifically studied:
  - Lanciano, Italy, About 750 A.D.
  - Buenos Aires, Argentina, 1996
  - Tixtla, Mexico, 2006
  - Sokółka, Poland, 2008
  - Legnica, Poland, 2013



- Similar findings from scientific studies of Eucharistic miracles:
  - Human heart muscle, blood type AB (same as Shroud of Turin).
- Scientific studies affirm EMs are divine signs that manifest the Real Presence of Body & Blood of Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist.

- At Mass, Jesus offers his living heart in the Holy Eucharist.
  - Heart that suffered for love of us.
  - Jeannette Williams regarding EMs: "It's as if Jesus, by transforming into a human heart, is crying out to us, 'I'm here! I love you! My heart yearns for you! Was not my crucifixion enough to prove my love for you? See, then, and believe. I have remained hidden in the Eucharist for these two thousand years that I may remain close to you. Please, approach me. Receive me. Quench my thirst for your love'."
- St. John Vianney: "There is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, He would have given it to us."

## MASS: Strengthens us for our mission

- Our mission is to go forth to love and serve the Lord and one another.
  - "By their fruit shall you know them."
- Mass equips us for our mission.
  - Christ strengthens us in His community,
  - Forms us by His Word, and
  - Nourishes us in our Holy Communion with Him.

#### MASS: Commands of God, Jesus, and the Church



- 3rd Commandment:
   "Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day."
- At Last Supper, Jesus commanded us to "do this in remembrance of me."

   Mass attendance on
   Sundays & Holy Days.

  - Reveals the coming together of heaven and earth at Mass, as seen by saints and mystics, revealed by Scripture, and in the Catechism of the Catholic Church.



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
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
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
